Who do you feel might be speaking to the uncertainty of our world with words of Hope?  1. Listen to the <b>poet</b> . Assuming hope is coming to the longing heart.  2. Listen to the <b>politician</b> . When is it right to praise a leader to bring the best out?  3. Listen to the <b>people</b> . We have a responsibility as community to live hopefully.  4. Listen to the <b>prophet</b> . A liturgical question asked by pilgrims going to worship.  5. Listen to the <b>painter</b> . The honesty of the self portrait - looking in a mirror.  6. Listen to the <b>preacher</b> . Hope is discovered not in manmade traditions but in the presence of love.  7. Listen to the <b>pastor</b> . Every type of suffering in the end produces character. Character produces hope.

Who do you feel might be speaking to the oppressed of our world with words of Freedom and Justice?  1. Listen to the poet. You reap what you sow. 2. Listen to the protector. The unseen army of God. 3. Listen to the prophet. You'll see and hear things that will give you courage. 4. Listen to the politician. Don't put your trust in political celebrity - there's no freedom. 5. Listen to the preacher. Faith that does not bring about transformation is not real faith. Freedom gives us the faith to believe the impossible. 6. Listen to the pastor. Verse 26, not a pastoral verse or is it? What is happening in the subtext? Gentiles are admitted to the table of Grace because of their faith?  7. Listen to the people. Sometimes the people see it and freedom comes to those who have been oppressed and the songs of freedom are the people's songs.

Who do you feel might be speaking to a world that is in pursuit of madness?  1. Listen to the <b>protestant</b> . Everything is crazy, God has hidden himself - His absence speaks of his presence. He knows where we are even if we think we have lost him. Wisdom speaks in the silence  2. Listen to the <b>pastor</b> . In a world of fools God can still be gracious.  4. Listen to the <b>pastor</b> . In a world of fools God can still be gracious.  4. Listen to the <b>people</b> . If only we applied our hearts to wisdom in the way so many apply their hearts to becoming rich and famous. Nothing last except the grace of God. The steadfast love of the Love endures for ever.  5. Listen to the <b>preacher</b> . True wisdom is found in the Word of God. His wisdom confounds the mighty, turns the perceived understanding upside down.  6. Listen to the <b>politician</b> . Use the voice of the prophet or pastor to speak to a world where for many generosity works if it's in conjunction with a tax break.  We are living in a world where people talk of 'generosity fatigue'. Generosity is of course the sister of gratitude. When we are generous it is, and should be, out of gratitude for what we have received from the hand of God.  Feel free to add your own choice of voices. Who do you feel might be speaking to our self indulgent world about generosity?  I. Listen to the poet. Look at the generous spirit of a mother and wife. Interesting song entitled 'No Charge'. A song of a mother speaking to her kid who is looking for more pocket money.  2. Listen to the pastor. Happiness is not found in possessions or being popular and greedy for the applause of human beings. Instead happiness is found in being fruitful and generous. Like fruit trees the generous share their fruit.  3. Listen to the people. The people don't always want to hear the truth - preaching can be a dangerous occupation. Look what happened to Martin Luther King Jr.  4. Listen to the prophet. Sometime the prophet feels sorry for herself. She speaks of generosity and gratitude no one listens. But it is in our own act of generosity that we encounter the blessing.  5. Listen to the peacemakers. How wondrous this verse anticipating the response of the harvest that comes from sowing seeds of peace.  6. Listen to the people.
