



God is in the business of making all things new...

Throughout the Bible, and across human history, and in this current age, God surprises us with new things. As Spring gathers pace, what are the new things that God is showing you in your life? In your community? In your corner of the Kingdom?

All this month we're thinking about newness with God. We will explore the tension of how an eternal unchanging God can at the same time being doing *new things*. We will be asking what is 'newness' anyway? What does it mean to *be* new? Or to be *made* new?

And how about that sometimes patronising phrase when we talk about someone being "a *new* Christian"? How can we cherish wisdom and experience without creating a status system where the insights of newcomers are diminished? And shouldn't we all try to be new Christians anyway, however long we've been at it? Ever new. Ever green. Ever open.

Because newness isn't the same as novelty. Newness doesn't have to mean a fad or a craze or a revolution, change for change's sake. A tree will likely spend its whole life in one small patch of forest, not moving or going anywhere but still forever new – growing, adapting, developing, listening to the world around it. A tree may be rooted to the same spot but it's always finding new ways to be. Even in decay a tree becomes something new for others, with fallen logs being an important part of the forest ecosystem.

Embracing newness with God doesn't have to mean always chasing the latest trend. Newness with God is realising that openness to change and blossoming and refinement are part of being faithful. The ever-new is blessedly all around us, and we can be evernew in our relationship with the world. Each year is new again. Each spring brings newness. And each present moment is always new, hand given to you.

God always gives us new opportunities. New ways to see, to understand. God's love is new for you each day, it doesn't go stale. It's alive. It's simultaneously ancient and new.

The Spirit is moving and all things are being made new. Even you.

So when we come to God with the things that are broken, God replies: It's not written off, discarded, thrown aside, irredeemable. It can be made new.

All things can be made new.

Each week of the five week theme runs Sunday-Saturday and has its own subtheme, which contains daily Bible readings and prompts for thought.

New moves (1 May)

In our first reading Ananias has to get his head around the fact that God is doing something new with someone new. Ananias is a faithful follower, but he's thrown. This isn't how things are meant to go, has someone given him the wrong script?

The thing is, when we talk about 'following' God it implies that God is *going somewhere*. It is, after all, hard to follow someone who is standing still. We are part of an eternal cosmic dance of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It's always been the same dance, but from time to time God throws in some new moves, keeping us on our toes. So Ananias, it's time to throw some shapes.

From little details to big canvases (8 May)

Newness with God occurs from the cosmic to the molecular. New things are happening chemically, biologically, materially and energetically all the time. Under our feet, through the air, and between the stars. In our lives God is working new things at every level too, from the small details to the big canvasses, from the moments too subtle to notice to the ones too big to ignore.

What if Jesus isn't the messiah we sometimes expect him to be? And what if his project is still bigger than we can understand even now, 2,000 odd years later?
 - **3. God is about to do a new thing.** Thinking of verse 19, how do we perceive when something new is springing forth?
 - **4.** Looking up and looking down. The wonders of heaven and the wonders of the human heart.
 - 5. In him all things hold together. The ever-ancient and ever-new, the timeless and timely are all connected in Christ.
 - **6.** Singing new songs! God cares more for new songs than old war horses.
 - 7. In our big canvasses of despair God can paint with hope. In the unfolding cosmic drama of eternity God makes time for new mercies every morning.
